Important Notice with regard to Programme Events / Presentations held on First Floor

Since seating in these venues is limited, all attendees at the event / presentation are **required** to obtain an **Event Booking Ticket** from the **Event Ticket Collection Area** outside **Hall 2** on the **Ground Floor** of the Convention Centre.
